



TEXT STRUCTURES: WHAT ARE THEY— AND WHY DO I CARE?

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Text Structures

- Description – when descriptive details are used to describe a specific person, place, thing, idea.
- Problem/Solution – to explain/highlight a problem, and give one or more solutions.
- Sequence – organize steps or events that take place over time.
- Compare/contrast – text is organized where you look at two or more items/ideas to establish similarities and/or differences.
- Cause & effect – causal relationship between a specific event, idea or concept; gives details regarding what triggers certain events/things to happen.

Teaching Text Structures to Improve Reading Comprehension & Writing

- Used with undergraduate pre-service teacher candidates in RDG 3332 – Reading in the Content Areas. These students are seeking difference degrees for teacher certification: EC-6, 4th-8th, EC-6 w/SPED-12th.
- After reading a variety of trade books for several content areas (social studies, science, math) – I give an overview of text structures using the Powtoon videos. Student are then given a “Text Structures” assignment – (instructions are attached) – they select one of the trade books they’ve read to complete the assignment.
- Part of the assignment asks them to reflect on their learning.
- In general – the majority respond on what they learned, how it aided their comprehension, and they would like to use in their future classrooms. (Student samples are included/attached.)
